I've directed high-end television both contemporary and period and made many short films. I've completed tight schedules and worked as lead director as well as directing whole series. I've filmed in HD, Arri LF and film - including super 16mm and worked with high profile actors as well as those new to the screen. My experience in theatre has given me added skills and understanding for working closely with actors at all stages of their careers. I've also trained in script development and film-editing and produced and directed documentary films which further adds to my skills as a director giving me a good balance of experience in all areas. I've taken crews abroad, directed live-action and filmed large dramatic action scenes including fights, scenes with horses, train and car crashes, rescues at sea, WW1 battle scenes and fires, as well as taut drama and light comedy. I've also worked with intimacy co-ordinators and stunt co-ordinators, used multiple cameras, and filmed many medical scenes including births.
